The Council with recommendations of the Committee shall appoint an Editor who shall administer the actual printing and distribution of the news bulletin.

Constitution, Article VIII, Section 2 (State Committees):

(e) Missouri Lions All State Band Committee --- It shall be the duty of this Committee to supervise the conduct and operation of the Missouri Lions All State Band. This Committee, with the approval of the Council, shall set policy for the Band, shall determine the functions at which the Band shall perform, shall administer the Missouri Lions All State Band Fund with the approval of the Council, and shall elect a Chief Band Director who shall administer and conduct the Band. The Chief Band Director shall as part of his duties administer any funds allotted to him by the Council. He shall be bonded to cover the maximum cost of the funds entrusted to him. The cost of such bond shall be paid out of the Missouri Lions All State Band Fund. The Committee with the approval of the Council may appoint from time to time such Band Directors as the Committee deems appropriate to assist the Chief Director in the administration and conduction of the Band. The funds necessary to finance the expenses procurement of the band, such as uniforms, music, travel, board and lodging for rehearsals and engaging in approved performances, shall be obtained from the Missouri Lions All State Band Fund and through grants made by Lions Clubs and others sponsoring band members in accordance with the procedures established by the Council. It shall be the duty of the Chief Band Director, with the approval of the Council, to store, maintain and preserve any and all equipment, including uniforms, used by the Band from time to time.

Justification: Update operation of the Missouri Lions All-State Band.

Constitution, Article VIII, Section 2 (State Committees):

(k) State Athletic Committee --- In addition to the members appointed by the District Governors the committee may itself appoint advisors to help carry out its charge. Advisors are not entitled to vote or to reimbursements for mileage expenses without prior approval by the Council. The State Athletic Committee shall be responsible for all athletic events of this Multiple District. the annual All-State All-Star Football Game. The committee shall prepare a budget for each event the game for council approval, and shall identify the designation for funds in the budget. The committee shall make regular reports, including financial reports, to the Council. A detailed financial report shall be given to the Council at its fall meeting. Net funds generated by this committee shall be donated to any approved projects, programs and supported organizations of Multiple District 26, per the Multiple District 26 Policy Manual.

- (a) Ten dollars and fifty cents (\$10.50 [\$12.00 if the exception in Section 1 (a) has been invoked]) per member of the annual per capita tax shall be forwarded by the District Cabinet Secretary-Treasurer and shall be divided in the following proportions and placed in the following funds by the State Council Secretary-Treasurer: Seventy cents (\$0.70) per year in the International Convention Fund; Eight dollars and seventy cents (\$8.70) per year in the State Administrative Fund; Seventy cents (\$0.70) per year in the Youth Leadership Activities Fund Missouri Lions All State Band Fund; and forty cents (\$0.40) per year in the International Candidates' Election Fund except when the condition in Section 1(a) is invoked the International Candidates' Election Fund will receive one dollar and ninety cents (\$1.90) per year.
- (b) Six dollars (\$6.00) per member of a Campus Club the annual per capita tax shall be forwarded to the State Council Secretary-Treasurer and shall be divided in the following proportions and placed in the following funds by the State Council Secretary-Treasurer: forty cents (\$0.40) per year in the International Convention Fund; five dollars (\$5.00) per year in the State Administrative Fund; forty cents (\$0.40) per year in the Youth Leadership Activities Fund Missouri Lions All-State Band Fund; and twenty (\$0.20) per year in the International Candidates' Election Fund.
- [2]- Multiple District By-Laws Article VIII, Section 5. Missouri Lions All State Band Fund. This fund shall be used to pay the authorized and necessary expenses of the Missouri Lions All State Band as defined in Article VIII, Section 2 (e) hereof- until this fund is depleted; then, they may request funds from the Youth Leadership Activities Fund.
- [3]- Multiple District By-Laws Article VIII, Section 6 (New). Youth Leadership Activities Fund. Expenses of the youth related committees, which consist of the band, athletic, and Lions Opportunities for Youth Committees may request operating funds from the Youth Leadership Activities Fund as specified in the Policy Manual.
- [4]- Multiple District By-Law Article VIII, Renumber current Sections 6 8 to read 7 9.

Lions are "Message Carriers"

What Happens When an International Advocate for Women Needed a Miracle? A Divine Message Placed by a Lion Appeared



While Wendi was working to help women learn to read by the water wells in South Sudan, her eyesight started to diminish. She was going blind from Retinitis Pigmentosa.

Receiving such a tough diagnosis, she decided to go camping on her own for a week. "I didn't want to fall apart in front of my kids." From her home in Wisconsin, she went to Bridgeman, MI, camping on the sand dunes. She made a list of everything she'd miss, including the chance to someday see her grandkids' faces. The concession stand on the beach happened to have a Lions Club brochure featuring a "really cute" guide dog from Leader Dogs for the Blind. "I'd never have guessed that seven years later that organization would make a profound difference in my life."

She didn't fall apart. Continued next column

"I thanked God for saving me from a nervous breakdown.

I just decided not to give up. The inspiration I got from my refugee friends gave me the strength to go on.

I'm a storyteller and a fundraiser who's committed to positive change. I could still be that person. My life's work now has become decreasing the stigma of blindness and other disabilities caused by ableist attitudes."

Only 10% of legally blind people use a white cane or a sight dog to go places on their own. When you use these aids, she says, you gain independence, but you make your blindness known to others. "For me, coming out with my blindness gave me my life back." At first Wendi was "embarrassed" to be going blind. "Not anymore," she says. "My goal now is to help others with low or no vision remain independent." She's dedicated to combatting ableism and to improving the safety and accessibility of environments.

As baby boomers mature, Wendi says, age-related blindness is a growing concern. "I'm sounding the alarm. We're reaching a crisis point. We need many more resources to help people with sight loss stay independent."



Getting Clean and Giving Back



This Lion knows what it's like to be in a bad place

Lion Greg Part sees the faces of the homeless on the streets of his town every day, but what separates him from the many who drive by, is that he stops.

The executive director of the nonprofit organization Neighbor2Neighbor (N2N) in Raytown, Mo., was homeless for 3.5 years. He lived in abandoned buildings, struggled with addiction, and never knew what the next day would bring until a church reached out to help him.

Now 63, sober for 26 years, and president of the Raytown Lions e-club on the south side of Kansas City, Mo., he sees addiction as the largest cause of homelessness. How do you get people off the streets? "You help them into recovery," he says.

Weekly, Parr takes people to AA meetings, helps others ger into treatment, and checks in on those in the recovery process. "He's a Godsend. He reached out and helped me get into detox three years ago," says recovering addict Latisha Robinson. "No one's done what he's done. He's been there with me every step of the way, and that random act of kindness completely changed my life around," she says. "He is somebody who does the right thing for the right reason."

At N2N, those in need can find clothes at their clothing pantry, hot meals, and sack lunches to take home. Most of all, they've found a friend in Parr.

He credits the Lions clubs in the Kansas City area as well as the Philippine Nurses Association of Greater Kansas City for their help in collecting clothes for the pantry, peanut butter and jelly for sandwiches, and more. Knob Noster Lion Tim Storms became friends with Parr at district Lions meetings. When Storms club east of Kansas City planned to help Parr's weekly feed for the less fortunate and homeless, it turned out that club members were all working or otherwise committed. Storms was available. By himself, he cooked and delivered 30 pounds of ribs, 40 pounds of mashed potatoes, plus corn and baked beans, and then helped serve abour 125 people. "I'm not the hero here,"
he says. "These people are the true
saints in the Neighbor2Neighbor
program where Greg sets up and
feeds the homeless. I'm not. I just
volunteered to help because I was
taught to help anyone when you can.
The real heroes are the people like
Greg who are here every week."

With the help of Kansas City World Outreach Lions and the nurses, N2N provides an annual Christmas Eve breakfast and health fair for the community. Along with a hot breakfast, they offer vision screening for kids, diabetes tests, chiropractor services, and drug treatment referrals onsite. Warm clothing, care kits, and sack lunches are there to take home, as well as toys for the children.

World Outreach Lion PDG Patricia Alcy Malkmus, widely known as Lion Alcy, is a big proponent of what Parr's doing. She felt it important that he get to know the service of Lions, and for the Lions to know him, so the asked him to speak at one of their club meetings, then recruited him to join. "Lion Alcy? Oh, she's good at recruiting," says Parr. "She got me."

Recovering alcoholic and addict Willie Vaughn credits Parr for helping him look at his life and change it, but also to look outside himself and help others. "I feel in my heart that he's preparing me to do things that need doing. I'm so grateful for him," says 58-year-old Vaughn, who rides with Parr to weekly AA meetings. "He is a blessing to whoever allows him into their life,"





PDG Jerry Romig (M5) has long been collecting editions of the Lion Magazine that is published through LCI. He recently handed over his large collection to the State Office. Become a Host Family: Is Hosting Right for Me?

Are you interested in learning about other cultures and ways of life while sharing your own customs and experiences? Are open-mindedness, tolerance and cultural competence of high importance to you? Do you have a desire to contribute towards peace, international understanding, and the creation of young global citizens? If you answered yes to any of these questions, you may enjoy being a host family for the Youth Camp and Exchange Program (YCE)!



⇒ Benefits of Hosting

Hosting a young person from another country is a fulfilling experience and has many benefits:

- You experience the joy of sharing your culture and daily customs
- You learn about your visitor's customs and culture
- You open a new world of possibilities and thinking to a young person
- You make a new friend maybe a friend for life

⇒ What to Expect

Youth participants are usually between the ages of 15 and 22, and come from any of the more than 200 countries and geographic locations where there are Lions clubs. He/she will have completed an admissions process before being accepted to participate in the program. He/she may or may not know the language of your country but will have a desire to learn. Host families should include the participant in their daily routine, including family meals, as YCE is intended to be an immersive learning experience. Local excursions are not required of host families, but the host Lions club often arranges for participants to visit local points of interest and engage in social activities, like picnics and get-togethers.

\Longrightarrow Host Family Eligibility

The host Lions club must approve all host families. To be eligible to become a host family you must:

- Have regular contact with youth of the approximate age of the participant
- Be familiar with Lions clubs and the goals of YCE
- Be able to provide a bed and meals for your guest
- Follow all local laws related to youth protection

⇒ How to Apply

Apply to become a host family today by contacting your <u>local Lions club</u>. Or submit a <u>host family application</u> to your local Lions club for review.

Once an exchange is confirmed, you and your guest will correspond via e-mail, mail or telephone. You should also attend an orientation provided by the host Lions club. This orientation will help prepare you for one of the most exciting experiences of your life, and answer any questions you may have about the exchange program.

Topics may include:

- Cultural tolerance
- Cultural adaptation (including host family relations)
- Host family role
- Rules and logistics, along with other pertinent information about Lions clubs
- Role of sponsor Lions club and host Lions club and districts
- Travel
- Visas and passports
- Immunizations
- Insurance

M6 District Letter DG Phyllis Krebs

Goal setting is important. Goals allow us to dream about the future and how we might want things to be and possibly make it happen. The New Year frequently encourages us to think about what has happened in the past...are we

happy with the outcomes? What changes can we make to improve/change the outcomes? Do we need a totally new plan and just start over? As we start the second half of this Lions year, this is also a good time for us to review our club and personal Lion goals for this year. Are we achieving what we wanted to achieve by this time; is there something more we can do to make our goals reachable, or do we need to make some adjustments? I want to share my evaluation of the goals I had set at the beginning of this year. I don't want to lower my expectations as I still feel this District has the potential to grow new clubs, gain members and improve service to our communities. I am hopeful that revised strategies, recommitment to responsibilities we accepted, and some additional effort can make huge strides towards achievement.

New clubs and members--

One of my initial goals for District 26M6 was to charter a Campus club at MSU. That hasn't happened yet, but we continue to identify more contacts on the MSU campus to help with this effort. I continue to believe this

The bad news here is that we have lost 2 clubs; the Joplin Host club, which was expected and the Buffalo club, which was a total surprise. We are working on plans to bring both of those clubs back, plus Lion Frank Lambrecht and the El Dorado Springs Lions are working to charter a new LEO club in El Dorado Springs! Another of my District goals was to increase District membership. We started our year with 835 members and currently have 854; that's a

27-member gain for the year! The 7 Governors of the Missouri Districts instituted a contest this year; the District with the greatest increase in membership each quarter takes possession of a trophy, a beautiful crystalline statue. 26M6 has had possession of this trophy since October and we hope to retain possession. A huge Thank You to all the clubs who have successfully recruited new members, this is YOUR trophy and you should be very proud.

But, let's not stop now. Ask someone everyday to become a Lion! I believe that this whole Covid-19 experience has made us more acutely aware of the needs in our communities. Many people are looking for ways to provide service. Ask people to help with your service projects. Be open to new ideas and opportunities to provide service. You might give someone the very opportunity they didn't know they needed.

Leadership training essential to the development of our District. In the last few years, training has not happened, Covid-19, of course, played a huge role in that, but without leaders we cannot grow. Training did not happen this year in the manner I had hoped, but we were able to connect with 6 of our 7 Zones. Attendance was light, but we did see some new faces, which was exciting! Packets were provided to those club officers who did not make it to the 'live sessions'.

While I'm on this topic, I want to reiterate the importance of allowing club members to seek higher club offices if they wish to advance in leadership. Each club has a nomination and election process to provide club leadership. One person holding onto the position of President for several years is detrimental to the development of new leaders from that club and negatively impacts the potential leadership pool for the District. The role of Past President is very

Important to the leadership development plan for a club as well as for the District. The Past President should be there for support and to help with those tough issues.

Unless a Lion has served 1 year as club President, they cannot serve the District as Zone Chair. Unless a Lion has served 1 year as Zone Chair, they are not eligible to seek nomination as Second Vice District Governor. We currently have 1 Zone without a Zone Chair. We have 2 Zones with a PDG serving as Zone Chair. This next year, PDG's will no longer be allowed to serve as Zone chair so VDG Bart will be looking for past club presidents willing to step up to serve as Zone Chairs. Please help him with this challenge.

I reflected on Lions International's mission "To empower Lions clubs, volunteers, and partners to improve health and well-being, strengthen communities, and support those in need through humanitarian services and grants that impact lives globally, and encourage peace and international understanding." And vision "To be the global leader in the community and humanitarian service." And there IT was—we would SERVE!

District 26M6 will be collecting supplies and assembling first aid kits, contained in a clear plastic eyeglass case, during our convention for those who are unsheltered in our community. According to the Community Partnership Ozarks Alliance to end Homelessness, Springfield has more than 6000 unsheltered adults and children, and the numbers are growing. These first aid kits will be distributed by The Venues Church through their current outreach programs. We hope to share more opportunities to SERVE together!



Forgotten Initiative & Lions Book Drive

The Forgotten Initiative is a faith-based support system for those connected to foster care. This can include social workers, foster families, young adults, children, and infants.



Lions of M6-26 are collecting new and lightly used children's books that can be shared with a child going into foster care. Many children enter foster care with little or nothing else than what they are wearing. The collected books will be included with backpacks and age-appropriate clothing that go to children in an emergency foster placement. The Marshfield Activities Center serves as the area collection point where needed items are made available for distribution.
