MD26-M1 District Governor Larry Kimbrow Receives Lions Presidential Award



Melaina's Magical Playground was inspired by the daughter of a local couple. She was a spunky, 3-year old who did not let a disease like *Memaline Myopathy* diminish her spirit. Even though she had physical limitations, she still wanted the adventure that comes to a child through a playground. In her memory and honor, her parents and other local community leaders organized a committee with the goal of building a playground with no limitations for any individual. When the idea of the all-inclusive playground was first pitched to the community, the estimated cost was \$500,000. By 2010 the estimate had risen to \$750,000.

Lion Larry served as the District Governor during the 2010-2011 Lionistic year. The Cape Girardeau Noon Club had already joined as a partner on the project, but needed the support

of the Lions District. As his signature project for his DG term, Lion Larry decided to adopt **Melaina's Magical Playground.** He received unanimous support for the project during his first District Cabinet Meeting and began working to prepare and submit a Standard Grant Application to Lions Clubs International Foundation for a matching grant of \$75,000.

Once the grant was approved District Governor Larry traveled extensively through-out the 25 country area of the southeast and central Missouri soliciting donations for the "matching funds" from Lions Clubs, other civic organizations and local businesses.

After his 2010-2011 tenure as District Governor, he still worked closely with the original organizers to ensure the proper funds were raised for the playground. By March 2012, over \$780,000 had been raised. Lion Larry, representing District 26-M1, was invited to the official groundbreaking in Cape Girardeau. On September 27, 2013 after almost five years of fundraising and close to a million dollars in donations, a Ribbon Cutting and Offical Opening was conducted for **Melaina's Magical Playground.**

Throughout the project, Lion Larry's exceptional planning and meticulous attention to detail added materially to the timely completion of the District's fundraising goals and timelines. His leadership, dedication and perseverance were directly responsible for the Lions Clubs being recognized as a valuable partner in this very successful regional project.

Lion Larry also stepped up to be District Governor again in 2013-2014, so he was able to be on the start and finish of this project while serving his district as Governor. With his professional ability, personal initiative and total dedication to the project, Lion Larry's performance reflected great credit upon him and were in keeping with the highest traditions of Lions Clubs International.

Lions Club International President Barry J. Palmer signed the letter officially recognizing District Governor Larry Kimbrow for actions above and beyond what would normally be expected. Past International Director Scott Rennels presented the Lion Recognition Award to DG Larry Kimbrow at the closing banquet ceremonies at the 92nd Annual Missouri Lions State Convention.

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Missouri Lions MD-26 2014 Proposed Changes to the Constitution and By-Laws

Five propositions were submitted for delegates at the Multiple District on April 26, 2014 and reflect amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws of the Missouri Lions MD26. These included approval of the 2016 State Convention location in Springfield, MO, expanding the scope of the Athletic Committee, updating references to the new Saving Sight organization, allowing for annual financial reviews instead of more expensive financial audits, as well as some housekeeping cleanup.

The following proposition was rejected by the delegates, the other 4 propositions were approved, and those amendments will be reflected in the Constitution and by-Laws of the Missouri Lions MD26.

PROPOSITION NO. 1

A RESOLUTION TO MODIFY THE SCOPE OF THE ATHLETIC COMMITTEE TO ALLOW FOR INCREASED INVOLVEMENT BY YOUTH IN LIONS-SPONSORED ATHLETIC PROGRAMS. IT ALSO WILL ALLOW FOR MALE AND FEMALE INVOLVEMENT BY ALLOWING FOR THE EXPANSION INTO OTHER SPORTS.

SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?


BE IT RESOLVED, that Article VI, Section 6 (m) of the Multiple District 26 Constitution be amended to read as follows:

State Athletic Committee -- In addition to the members appointed by the District Governors the committee may itself appoint advisors to help carry out its charge. Advisors are not entitled to vote or reimbursements for mileage expenses without prior approval by the Council. The State Athletic Committee shall be responsible for the annual All-State All-Star Football Game providing and supporting athletic opportunities for Missouri youth. The committee shall prepare a budget for the game its activities and for the activities of its subcommittees for Council approval.

Missouri School for the Blind provides services for more than 1,400 students, families and service providers in Missouri through the K-12 and short-term programs on campus, and Outreach Services. MSB is accredited through both state and national organizations and provides common core academics as well as an outstanding Expanded Core Curriculum (ECC). The ECC offers instruction in braille and communication skills, orientation and mobility, social interaction, independent living, recreation and leisure activities, career education, assistive technology, visual efficiency and self-determination.

MSB's short-term programs are available for students who are blind or visually impaired and attending public schools. The KEYS program offers targeted instruction in the Expanded Core Curriculum as determined by a student's individual needs — such as orientation and mobility, braille, and assistive technology. The LIFE program is designed for older students preparing to transition out of the academic setting and into a more independent lifestyle. Activities of daily living — such as cooking, cleaning, organizational skills, personal care and safety — as well as career preparation or college readiness are all aspects of the LIFE program.

This summer, MSB will offer two enrichment courses designed to improve student performance in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM). In each of the two-week STEM sessions, students will use speech- and/or text-accessible assistive technology, as well as tactile models to facilitate independent exploration. The first session is "Fantasy Baseball and Real-Life Mathematics." Students will create and manage a fantasy baseball team while tracking stats and injury reports on a daily basis. At the end of this session, students will participate in the MSB Beep-Ball All Star Tournament under the direction of experienced staff

and a 2013 World Series Beep-Ball Finalist. The second STEM summer session, "Earth Journey," features nine days of exploring, hiking, researching and studying the ecosystem. Students will collect samples and conduct experiments in our state-of-the-art science lab to analyze data and make inferences regarding healthy and unhealthy ecosystems.

MSB's location in St. Louis enables the Orientation and Mobility (O&M) instructors to provide a variety of environments for mobility training using our campus, residential areas, urban, and natural outdoor settings. The O&M program teaches students to determine their location, no matter where they are, and how to safely reach their destination. As skills improve, public transportation is added to instruction.

In addition to the rigorous academic program, MSB offers students many unique extracurricular opportunities, including varsity athletics with competitive goalball, track and field, wrestling, cheerleading, swimming, and speech/debate. Students are also involved in intramural sports and a variety of special interest clubs. Our students enjoy outings to the zoo, circus, museums, riverboat cruises, baseball games and more. It is with the support of the community, and Lions like you, that we are able to offer so many of these experiences for a well-rounded educational experience for students who are blind or visually impaired.

In March we held out 4th district cabinet meeting and 26-M6 District Convention in Joplin. Although attendance was lower than hoped for, the convention was successful and enjoyed by all. Our guest speaker International Director Mike Molenda and his wife Linda were great additions to our convention, and I am sorry for those unable to attend.

This past weekend, April 24th thru 26th, we held our 4th Council of Governors meeting and the State Convention in Sedalia. This marks the beginning of the end of my year as District Governor of 26-M6. I still have clubs to visit, as well as other functions, so there remain things to get accomplished.





Four-Year-Old's Eyesight Saved by KidSight Screening



Thanks to a KidSight screening and her family's prompt response to the screening results, four-year-old Raileen of Arcadia, Missouri can still see today. Raileen was born with unequal vision in her two eyes, known as anisometropia, which resulted in 20/80 vision and a weaker left eye. When a KidSight technician visited the Iron County Head Start that Raileen attended, the screening equipment detected a problem with her eyes, and Raileen's parents were urged to take her to an eye doctor for professional examination and treatment. Thankfully, Jennifer, Raileen's mother, acted on the referral right away and

sought eye care for her daughter, first from a local eye doctor and then from a pediatric ophthalmologist in St. Louis. "Raileen was a late walker and didn't grab things as a baby like my other two kids," Jennifer said. "I did not know that you could be born with an eye disorder that bad. I thought eyesight just got worse as you get older. We had the pediatric eye screenings when she was a newborn, but it's hard to catch the problem then – children can't really see then anyway. As they grow, that's when you can find the problem."

The KidSight program screens children ages 6 months to 6 years old, with a special focus on preschool-aged children. Like Raileen, children at this age can be suffering from a vision problem but not yet be old enough to articulate or understand their poor eyesight. "That was my main question – does she know the difference?" Jennifer said. "When you're born with a problem, you get used to it. Raileen didn't know any better. She would try to walk and fall down sometimes, and we didn't know to think of her eyes." Anisometropia is the term for a difference in the refractive power between the two eyes. That difference affects depth perception, which could explain Raileen's difficulty with walking (i.e., she couldn't gauge distances very well). The difference in the eyes' ability to see also results in amblyopia, in which case the brain begins to ignore signals from the weaker eye. If left untreated, Raileen would have eventually gone blind in her left eye.

But Jennifer sought treatment for her daughter, and the ophthalmologist prescribed glasses as well as patching for two hours per day, for 6 months to a year. Patching is a common treatment for amblyopia that involves covering the functioning eye, which requires the child's brain to rely on and strengthen the weaker eye. "She keeps the glasses on, and she's

gotten comfortable with them," Jennifer reported. "The patching was a battle at first, but she's adapting to it. When the two hours are up, she takes the patch off and says 'I have two eyes now!' It's the funniest thing."

As long as Raileen keeps up with the patching and wears her glasses, her sight can be preserved. "She can actually see!" Jennifer said. "The KidSight screening saved my daughter's eyesight. We are very grateful. If we wouldn't have found the problem when we did, she'd be blind today."

KidSight Pilots Healthy Vision Day in Saint Louis Area



Thanks to a grant from the Employees Community Fund of Boeing St. Louis, KidSight is increasing its impact on childcare facilities in the Greater St. Louis region. The pilot project involves expanding KidSight to make the vision screenings interactive and educational for children and parents. In conjunction with the vision screening, childcare partners will receive a children's book about vision (I Can See Just Fine by Eric Barclay), a packet of carrot seeds to grow, promotional posters about healthy vision, and coloring pages about eye health. The project is designed to build relationships with childcare partners and raise KidSight's visibility amongst parents. As a result, the KidSight staff

hopes to help childcare partners teach their children about healthy vision and to better communicate with parents when their children are referred to eye doctors for detected vision problems.

Through the grant, Healthy Vision Day is being offered to 70 childcare facilities in the Greater St. Louis area (St. Louis, St. Charles, Jefferson, Lincoln, Warren, and Franklin counties and St. Louis City). When the project is completed this fall, the KidSight team will refine Healthy Vision Day based on partner feedback and then seek funding opportunities to grow the project on a broader scale.

Bonnie and Charlotte: Correspondence After Transplantation

Correspondence after donation and transplantation can be a positive part of the healing process for many people. Saving Sight offers donor families and cornea transplant recipients the opportunity to write to each other in a safe, positive environment. Acting as an intermediary, Saving Sight accepts the letters and then passes them on to the appropriate parties, which helps preserve everyone's anonymity. Recipients and donor families alike have said that correspondence had therapeutic effects.

When Bonnie's son, Cody, died in Divernon, Illinois after a car accident, he was able to donate skin and corneas. "Cody always wanted to be an organ donor," she said. One of his corneas was received by Charlotte from Clinton, Missouri, who needed the transplant to treat a corneal infection that threatened to destroy her entire eye. Quite soon after her transplant surgery, Charlotte initiated the correspondence process with the help of Paul, her son who lived with her and cared for the family farm. Paul said his mother was eager to correspond with her donor's family because she understood loss, having recently lost two grandchildren. "Because of that unselfish loved one was a donor and gave me a gift, I still have my eye," Paul remembered Charlotte saying. "So she wanted to contact the family and thank them."

With Paul's help, Charlotte sent a letter to Saving Sight which was then passed on to Scarlett, Cody's wife. "Scarlett didn't feel like she was ready to correspond, so I asked permission to correspond instead," said Bonnie. And with that, Bonnie and Charlotte began the process of getting to know each other. "Charlotte was very understanding that someone died to give her this cornea," Bonnie recalled. "She was a really sweet lady."

When people correspond for more than a year and both parties consent to communicating without anonymity, Saving Sight will connect the donor family and recipient so they can pursue contact on their own. Bonnie and Charlotte wrote several letters in that first year and continued contact in the years that followed. "We talked on the phone sometimes, at birthdays and at Christmas," Bonnie said. Eventually, Bonnie offered to visit Charlotte at her home in Clinton.

"My daughter Tara and I had discussed from the time I first started corresponding with Charlotte how we would love to meet her, although we knew it would be difficult on us. However, Tara was unable to come with me so I drove there on June 16, 2012, which was Cody and Scarlett's wedding anniversary," Bonnie said. "I stayed at Charlotte's house for three or four hours and met Paul. We had a wonderful visit. It was nice to have a part of Cody with her, to know that he lived on. Cody had big blue beautiful eyes, and I just loved the fact that I got to meet her and look in her eyes." Paul said the feeling was mutual: "It meant a lot to Mom to get to finally meet the person behind the voice on the phone, as Mom was unable to travel long trips."

Despite the happiness of meeting Charlotte face to face, Bonnie also found the experience to be emotionally trying. "I held it all together until I drove out of her driveway, and then I cried all the way home," Bonnie said. "It was Father's Day the next day and just meeting her – she was a wonderful lady. She was very appreciative of how Cody had died but was willing to give his cornea. She never took it for granted. That's why she wrote the letter – she wanted to know about the person who donated and his family."

Charlotte's daughter made quilted table cloths, and she gave one to Bonnie as a keepsake from their visit. "I cherish that," Bonnie said. "Charlotte had health issues, and I think she knew we wouldn't see each other again." In April of 2013, Charlotte passed away at the age of 91, and thanks to Paul's care, she was able to remain on the farm until a few days before her death.

Paul described his mother as having "an abundance of love that she shared with her eight children and many outside her family" and that she "was proud of Bonnie's friendship." Bonnie, too, looks back fondly on the trip: "I felt so fortunate to have met Charlotte. It's hard to explain what it's like to meet someone who has your son's cornea. But I can't say enough how blessed I felt by it all."
