# 46<sup>th</sup> Annual Melvin Jones Memorial Re-dedication Ceremony



January 10, 2015
Fort Thomas, Arizona

January 13, 1879 - June 1, 1961

**Melvin Jones** was born January 13, 1879 in the Arizona Territory, today this military facility is called Fort Thomas. He was the son of a captain in the United States Army stationed at Fort Thomas, Arizona. He spent the early years of his childhood watching the soldiers until approximately 1886 or 1887 when his parents moved east as his father was transferred to another facility.

After his family moved to the east, Melvin Jones settled in the Chicago area where he studied at Union Business and Chaddock Colleges of Quincy, Illinois. It is no surprise he would remain in the Chicago area to develop his own business. In 1912, Melvin Jones was the sole owner of his own insurance agency in Chicago, Illinois. This is how he became a member of the local business circle. After spending two years as the secretary for this business group, he proposed the circle of business members could provide needed services in their local communities. Then in 1917, Melvin Jones gave up his insurance agency to work full time at Lions Clubs International headquarters.

The Melvin Jones Memorial was erected and dedicated to honor the founder of Lions Clubs International Association in 1965. Each year an Annual Rededication Ceremony is held at the facility, this year the event will be held on January 10<sup>th</sup>, 2015. Every Lion is invited to attend this special ceremony to honor the founder of



### Fellow LIONS of Missouri and Arkansas

I am LION Phil Krebs of Missouri district M6, and I am Regional coordinator for the LIONS portion of the Canine Development Center campaign for Leader Dogs for the Blind.

It is my pleasure to bring you news of the work at Leader Dog and to enlist your help for the next 75 years of service to the vision impaired. Leader Dog was started in 1939 by three LIONS with "\$400 and a hat full of ideas" and 75 years later LIONS are 25% of their referrals for service, and annually contribute \$2 million of their \$11 million dollar budget for operations and client services.

To serve the current clients and those yet to come, Leader Dog has embarked on a 14.5 million dollar renovation and reconstruction of the 50 year old kennel and veterinary facilities. Think for a moment about our world today and what it was like 50 years ago. Imagine being blind then and the world you were travelling in, versus today and you will understand the need for the project. 75 years of experience in housing, training and caring for dogs have created the blueprint for the next 50 years in facilities, methods of training and animal husbandry.

### "Our dogs have the immense responsibility of being the eyes of our clients"

Do I need to say anything more? In one word, what we offer the client is <u>independence</u>. The ability to be involved in the world, the confidence to travel, the ability to show the sighted that *I am not blind, I just see things a little differently than you do*.

How can you help? Several ways really, but for now we need a pledge of support from your club, you as an individual LIONS member, or individuals that you know that feel this is an important endeavor worthy of support.

Your current club contributions go to support the daily operations of Leader Dog, the support for current recipients, future recipients, housing of dogs in training and everything else that goes with the LIONS motto "We Serve".

What we need are pledges of support over a 3-5 year window. Club pledges at the \$7500 level and above gain naming rights within the Canine Development center. All contributions from LIONS clubs at a \$75/member level and above get a banner patch for your banner based on the per member contribution level. In addition, personal member donations or non-LION personal donations on behalf of your club to the campaign are tax deductible and accrue to your club pledge of support. One time gifts are also welcome.

SPRINGFIELD, MO, October 24, 2014 - Vision Rehabilitation Center of the Ozarks (VRCO) and the Queen City Lions Club hosted the 13th Annual Memorial "Sight Saving Scramble," Friday, October 24, 2014. 52 golfers hit the links on to enjoy 18 holes of golf and some gorgeous fall weather at Millwood Golf & Racquet Club. The tournament included a sponsored beverage cart and an after party reception.





"Close your eyes and imagine for a moment that you could not read these words, watch TV or see your children grow up due to vision loss," shares Wendy Jackson, VRCO Executive Director. "VRCO is here to meet those needs and many others that people with vision loss face every day."

VRCO provides services to people of all ages regardless of their ability to pay. The latest technologies for low vision care are expensive and not covered by insurance. Patients face great challenges completing daily activities without proper vision care and assistive devices.

Since opening its doors in 2010, VRCO has helped over 1,700 people maintain independence through specialized vision care and the use of adaptive technology. VRCO has worked with more than 100 children, age's birth to three, and their families learn how to do things like explore their environment safely, prepare them for using braille, and transition into the school system.

It is through the continued support of the community that we are able to help improve the quality of life for people with vision impairments. The event proceeds of over \$12,000 will continue to help to magnify the quality of life for people with low vision or vision loss by providing these needed services and equipment.

Vision Rehabilitation Center of the Ozarks, VRCO, is the Ozarks' leader specializing in low vision optometry, neuro-optometry and First Steps vision services for children ages birth to three.

Founded by Mercy Eye Specialists, VRCO is a 501(c) (3) organization that is operated through private donations, local grants, and insurance reimbursement. Community partners include Abilities First, Delta Gamma Alumnae, Drury University, Lions Clubs of District 26, Mattax Neu Prater, Mercy Health System, and Missouri State University.

A community wide food drive for the Wellington Food Pantry was set from 1:00 to 3:00 on Saturday August 23rd. Drop off location was at the Wellington Park Band Stand located north of the 4 way stop at the Jct. of Hwy 224 and Hwy 131.

Most needed items are fruit, soup, hamburger helper, pork n beans, pasta sauce, pasta, mac & cheese, tuna, spaghetti o's, peanut butter, snack items, and toilet paper.

The Food Pantry serves families that are on the brink. Hunger exists in LAFAYETTE COUNTY according to the Missouri Hunger Atlas. With a population of 33,000 the survey found 16% of families with children food uncertain and 4% of households with children with serious need for food. The Wellington Food Pantry serves families in the Wellington and surrounding area twice a month. Over 35 families are given food through the Wellington Food Pantry. The Wellington Lions will collect the food and deliver it to the food pantry.

### **Norborne Soybean Festival**

Late summer and fall are seasons of festivals, large and small, throughout Missouri, and the Norborne Lions Club is no exception.

Coordinated in conjunction with the Norborne Soybean Festival Committee, the Norborne Lions Club began sponsoring the Norborne Soybean Festival in 1968. 

# Mission Group Recycles Used Eyeglasses in Jamaica



Many students from the local community received glasses to help them succeed in school.

Richard, a pastor from Bolivar, Missouri, has been doing mission work in rural Jamaica for the past 17 years. He and his fellow missionaries have built two churches in the Craighead and Warsop districts near the center of the Island. Twice per year, they bring at least one physician down to offer medical services to local people in need. Recently, Richard contacted Saving Sight to add eyeglasses to his mission clinics, and during his July 2014 trip, he and his team distributed 125 pairs of glasses.

"We were able to brighten so many lives," said Pastor Richard. "There were some so poor that they couldn't manage to purchase reading glasses even though they needed. It was a blessing to have Saving Sight help us in that community with the eyeglasses. It's added to our clinic in a remarkable way." Furthermore, providing glasses to those with vision problems has improved the efficiency

and effectiveness of the medical clinic. "The doctor was able to treat more patients who needed serious medical attention, as opposed to vision problems," he said. "He treated 300 patients in a week's time because the 125 people who came for glasses didn't need his time."

Pastor Richard and his team will be returning to Jamaica in October for another medical mission trip. Saving Sight has provided an additional 100 reading glasses for the upcoming trip. "To watch the people's faces—it's so wonderful that they're able to see after being handicapped for so many years," he said. "That's a blessing." Saving Sight looks forward to an ongoing partnership with Pastor Richard and his team as they change lives by saving sight.

# Preschooler Treated for Amblyopia Thanks to KidSight Screening

Colton, a 4-year-old from Florissant, MO, was screened by KidSight at his preschool. "That day, I got a letter home stating that they believed Colton had astigmatism and was nearsighted," said Kristina, Colton's mother. "At first I was concerned it was some sort of business ploy, so I brushed it off. But when I took Colton to school the next day, the teacher said Colton was the only one who received a referral. My heart sunk immediately." Once she understood the gravity of the situation, Kristina wasted no time in scheduling an appointment to have Colton's eyes examined by a pediatric eye specialist.

The doctor confirmed the screening results: Colton suffered from astigmatism and nearsightedness, which contributed to bilateral amblyopia, or "lazy eye" in both eyes. "I got tears in my eyes while the doctor explained all of this," said Kristina. According to the American Association for Pediatric Ophthalmology and Strabismus, bilateral amblyopia is best treated with consistent wearing of glasses, followed by regular visits to the eye doctor. And like most childhood vision problems, the earlier the problem is detected, the better it can be treated.

It took Colton a few weeks to start seeing a lot better with the prescription glasses, but he understands that he must wear them all the time. In fact, Colton has said, "These glasses give me x-ray vision. I can see everything now." Kristina said he enjoys sports and video games, and as the middle child of three boys, his brothers are his best friends. He likes taking care of his younger brother and playing with his older brother.

Because children with vision problems don't know their sight is poor, they just adapt to it and don't mention anything to their parents. Kristina now recalls how Colton always lay closest to the TV when the family gathered to watch. "I felt like a terrible parent for not realizing this sooner," said Kristina. "I didn't know how much he couldn't see." But small signs like this are only obvious in hindsight—most vision problems are undetectable to parents. That's why vision screening and professional eye care recommendations are so useful: vision problems can be found early and children like Colton can get the treatment they need before problems worsen.



"It takes this technology to help parents figure out that their children need help," said Kristina. "I cannot say thank you enough to Saving Sight and KidSight for the Impact It has had on Colton. He would have missed out on however many years of not being able to see things properly."

Eye doctors recommend that children receive an eye exam before starting grade school, and children with vision or learning problems should get exams earlier.
