


100Th Lions International Convention, Chicago, Illinois



Have you been an instructor at local or LCI sponsored Lions training events or do you have experience as a professional trainer? Then we have some exciting news for you! The Leadership Development Division is pleased to announce the new **Lions Certified Instructor Program!**

The Lions Certified Instructor Program (LCIP) will establish a group of certified instructors who will provide the highest quality instruction at all LCI-directed institutes, DGE seminar and other training related events. If you or someone you know has a talent for training others, this program may be of interest.

Why?

The purpose of the LCIP is to provide consistent delivery of effective training at all levels within Lions by increasing the number of qualified instructors, while providing a framework for broadening and deepening the knowledge and experience of instructors.

Who Qualifies?

Lions who are interested in applying to the LCIP must fall into at least one of the following categories:

- 1. Lions who have not yet served as faculty at a DGE seminar or LCI-directed institute, but who have experience as a professional trainer or educator (for five or more years).
- 2. Lions who have served as faculty at a local training (e.g. RLLI, district-level training for club officers, etc.) or conducted training at forums.
- 3. Lions who have served as faculty at a DGE seminar or LCI-directed institutes prior to July 2012.
- 4. Lions who have served as faculty at a DGE seminar or LCI-directed institute from July 2012 to the present.

Your qualifications above will determine the path you will need to take to be eligible for certification.

Lawnmower Riders "Race for the Cure"

On a spring Saturday in May 2017 the Patton Lions Club and members of the local Lawn Mower Riders association meet at the race track just outside the city limits. These two organizations have worked together for 3 years providing a great family activity for the young and old alike. Participants in these races are as young as 6 with no upper age limit with everyone eager to have a fun time.



Before the event there is a lot of work to prepare the race track as heavy rains from the previous night have left the surface very wet and muddy. The track must be dried out and packed before it can be used to race. Slowly the track starts to dry out as vehicles of all types pull rakes around and around the track. When the adults decide they cannot go in circles anymore; eager young participants assume the tedious task of preparing the track.

Finally after all the preparation the track is ready for the racers on their Lawn Mowers. Racers start to show up about two hours before the preliminary qualifying races. Officials from the Lawn Mower Racing association use the racers qualifying time to determine the different race groups.



Once the different race groups have been decided the races start. The Patton Lions Club and members of the Lawn Mower Racing association donated the profits from this particular race to the Cancer Society.

While the Lawn Mower Races provide the Patton, MO Lions Club with a great fundraising opportunity, it also provides much more to their community. It provides a foundation for parents and their children to share valuable time together helping building a stronger family. This activity also provides the youth with an opportunity to learn at a very early age the value of community service through the Lions Club Organization, what a wonderful way to develop the future Lions of this rural community.

Mission Trip to Memphis: A Patient's Story



Just imagine you are slowly going blind as your cataracts continue to get worse daily and you have no means to have the problem corrected. Then you hear about the Lions Clubs helping needy patients receive their eye surgery, so you contact your local Lions Club who refers you to Mid-South Lions Sight and Hearing Service for assistance with removing your cataracts.

Due to a dramatically increased need for service, you have been on the patient waiting list for over a year, but then you are contacted for a pre-surgical screening interview on May 13, 2017 at the Hamilton Eye Institute (HEI) in Memphis. Thanks to the HEI Lions Club, HEI Surgery Center, area ophthalmologists and medical personnel, Alcon, Novartis, Imprimis, Cardinal Health, Southern College of Optometry, the ASCRS Foundation's Operation Sight and Mid-South Lions, a large staff of doctors, members of several local Lions Clubs and other volunteers are there ready to treat you and approximately 30 other needy patients. After going through the pre-surgical screening, you are finally told to report to the Hamilton Eye Institute to have the cataract on your right eye removed.

June 2 finally is here and you grab a bus downtown Memphis to go to the Hamilton Eye Institute where they will remove your cataract during a "Mission Trip to Memphis" that was sponsored by the doctors and residents at the HEI. Unfortunately, no one is available to accompany you to surgery. This difficulty jeopardizes your chance at surgery. You worry that you will continue to live in darkness.

However, through Mid-South Lions program director Betty Douglas, two visiting Lions, Noma Paulin and Jennie Mosher are available to accompany you and another patient through the process. These two Missouri Lions provided company, lunch and comfort to the patients as they awaited post-op exams. This process took about 6 hours.

This patient required additional surgical procedures and continues to receive care through the Hamilton Eye Institute Surgery Center and Mid-South Lions. Doctors believe there is a good chance he will fully regain his sight.

The Dr. Ivan Marais Cataract-A-Thon provided 32 cataract surgeries in one day. This "Mission to Memphis" was a great success and will hopefully be the first of many successful Cataract-A-Thons.

Since getting his glasses, Tracy has noticed that Jayce does a great job hitting the ball in baseball, doesn't squint as much, and doesn't sit as close to the TV and other screens. "He will be just starting Kindergarten this year so I feel like we caught this right in time to help his education," said Tracy. "Healthy vision is very important and I feel like being able to see clearly will help him function properly."

Step 1: Complete a Volunteer Application

Step 2: Complete a Criminal Background Check

As our programs grow, volunteer applications and criminal background checks allow us to provide transparency and credibility to the daycares, schools, and Head Start centers that we serve. Once we receive your application, we will reach out to you with more information on how to submit your criminal background check. All of your personal information will be kept confidential.

Step 3: Schedule Your Volunteer Training

KidSight is dedicated to providing training opportunities for both staff and volunteers. Training for Volunteer Screening Assistants can be done online or via telephone and should take about 20 minutes. Volunteer Screening Technicians will require more


